



## Quick Referencing Guide Using APA 6<sup>th</sup> (Harvard) style

All the literature that you use in your own writing needs to be referenced **twice**:

- In the body of your text. This includes the author's name and the date of the work, enclosed in parentheses. If you have used a direct quotation (copied something word for word) you must also include the number of the page you copied the words from, e.g. p. 37
- In a reference list at the end of your document. This has full details of the publication, such as title(s), publisher, volume and page numbers. The format varies according to the type of literature you are referencing – see the examples below.

<b>Chapter in a book</b>	(Kreps, 2014) or Kreps (2014) stated that ... <b>Use the author(s) of the</b>	Kreps, D. G. P. (2014). Virtuality and humanity. In M. Grimshaw (Ed.), <i>Oxford Handbook of Virtuality</i> (pp. 712-726). Oxford: Oxford University Press.

<b>Journal article – electronic without DOI*</b>	<i>Follow the above examples for books.</i>	Bennett, R., Wallace, J., & Williamson, I. (2008). Organising land information for sustainable land administration. <i>Land Use Policy</i> , 25(1), 126-138.  <b>Treat as an article from a print journal.</b>
<b>Conference paper – print</b>	<i>Follow the above examples for books.</i>	Palmenfelt, U. (2010). <i>The social creation of grand narratives</i> . Paper presented at the the Eighth Folklore Fellows' Summer School: After the New Folkloristics?, Helsinki University, Lammi.
<b>Conference paper – electronic</b>	<i>Follow the above examples for books.</i>	Jaya, N., Pathirage, C., & Sutrisna, M. (2010). <i>An application of the activity-based costing for the management of project overheads to increase profit during the construction stage</i> . <b>Webpage – corporate author</b>	(Dolomites Nomination Committee, 2008)	Dolomites Nomination Committee. (2008). <b>Webpage – content likely to be updated</b>	<i>Follow the above examples for books.</i>	National Health Service. (2011). Epidermolysis Bullosa: treatment. Retrieved 13 June, 2011, from <a href="http://www.nhs.uk/Conditions/Epidermolysis-bullosa/Pages/Treatment.aspx">http://www.nhs.uk/Conditions/Epidermolysis-bullosa/Pages/Treatment.aspx</a>  <b>If the content is likely to change, include the date you retrieved the information.</b>
<b>Webpage – content not updated (e.g. PDF)</b>	<i>Follow the above examples for books.</i>	International Union for Conservation of Nature. (2010). Retrieved from <a href="http://www.iucnredlist.org/sotdfiles/lasiiorhinus-krefftii.pdf">http://www.iucnredlist.org/sotdfiles/lasiiorhinus-krefftii.pdf</a>  <b>The retrieval date is not required.</b>
<b>Secondary citation (i.e. where you have used information that you have found cited in another source).</b>	(Darwin, 1842, cited in Schlager & Keim, 2009)  or  Darwin (1842, cited in Schlager & Keim, 2009) described ...	Schlager, W., & Keim, L. (2009). Carbonate platforms in the Dolomites area of the Southern Alps: historic perspectives on progress in sedimentology. <i>Sedimentology</i> , 56(1), 191-204.  <b>Your Reference List should only include those sources which you have actually read yourself.</b>

**\*A DOI is a Digital Object identifier and appears on many electronic books or journal articles, usually near the top of the first page.**
