


Performance Information Sources

The main Library collections for Performance students are at **Adelphi** library, but you will also find material **online**, as well as in other libraries, such as Clifford Whitworth and MediaCityUK. Books and e-Books

All library resources (books, ebooks, DVDs, blu rays, games and more) are accessible via **SOLAR Library Search**.



Type in your search terms and select the tab which will be most useful to your search.

Sign in first to get more information from SOLAR, eg how long you can keep a book for.

To access SOLAR, go directly to the **Student Channel** <http://www.salford.ac.uk/students> and choose the 'Library & Learner Support' section (SOLAR Library Search is one of the options).

Each Library also has dedicated Quick Search PCs for searching SOLAR.

Finding Books

To find both print and electronic books, select the '**Books & more**' tab in SOLAR, type in your keywords, or other book details, and run the search. A list of books will appear.

For books available in print and available in the library, click on the **Get It** tab below the title. You'll see a class number for each title which shows you where it can be found in the library, for example: 302.2345 EVA. If it is available as an electronic book (ebook), it will say '**View It**'. Click on this tab and it will direct you to login to see the full text of the ebook (you may be prompted to enter a username and password here – use the same one as you logged in to the network with).

Journal Articles

You can use **SOLAR** for finding journal articles on a particular topic. It is recommended particularly for 1st year students as it is a good way to get started on using journal articles.

To start, from the main SOLAR screen, select the '**Articles & More**' option and then enter your search terms into the search box. When you find an article that looks useful, click on **View Online**. If the full text (complete journal article online) is available, you can click on **PDF** or **Full Text** to view the article.

E-Journals

You can also browse specific journal titles, for example, to keep up to date in your subject area. The Library provides access to thousands of electronic journals.

To search for an electronic version of a journal, go to **SOLAR Library Search** and click on the **E-Journals** link (top right of the screen). You can search for a journal title or browse the electronic journals in a particular subject area.

Directories, Yearbooks and Handbooks


There are a number of useful publications held in a permanent Quick Reference collection. These include directories, yearbooks, dictionaries and encyclopaedias. For example:

- Artistes and Agents
- Contacts (Spotlight)
- International Dictionary of Films & Film-makers

Database Searching

You can use databases to find information (mainly journal articles) on a particular topic. Access to all available electronic resources is via **SOLAR Library Search**.

To find a specific database, click on **Databases** on **SOLAR** (top right of the screen), & choose either 'Media, Music & Performance' from the 'Subject' list or select from the A-Z list.



Key databases in your subject area include:

- **Academic Search Premier** – general full text journal article resource.
- **Arts & Humanities Full Text** - titles include both scholarly peer-reviewed journals and selected trade and consumer titles relevant to applied arts and cultural studies. Subject strengths include music, theatre, film and cultural studies.

- **Box of Broadcasts** - off-air recording and media archive service, allowing recording of TV and radio programmes scheduled to be broadcast over the next 7 days as well as retrieving programmes from the last 7 days from a selected list of recorded channels.
- **Business Source Premier** – general full text journal article resources.
- **Film & Sound Online** – resource of downloadable non-fiction films. Contains Performance Shakespeare, of interest to Performance staff and students.
- **IEEE Xplore** – electronics database, useful for full text articles on virtual dance, drama, theatre.
- **International Index to the Performing Arts Full Text** – journal articles on all aspects of performance, including dance, theatre and music.
- **JSTOR** – full text academic journal resource; very good for music but also useful for film and performance.
- **Nexis** – full text press articles from regional and international **newspapers** and magazines. Very useful for performance reviews.

Off Campus Access

We recommend that you access all Databases via SOLAR as, where possible, dedicated University of Salford login links have been set up to accept your network username and password (i.e. UIS123 etc). If you access resources via another route, you will usually need to go via the '*Login via your Institution / Library / Organisation / Shibboleth*' link. Audio Visual Sources

Adelphi Library has:

- **DVDs** – mainly comprising feature films, music, performance, and art and design material.
- **Sound recordings** – range from classical music to pop, with a wide selection of jazz, world music and brass band material. There is also a collection of sound effects and background music CDs.

All materials can be found by searching SOLAR Library Search. There are viewing and listening facilities in the Adelphi library.

Dissertations & Theses

Specialist indexes, accessible from **SOLAR Library Search** (choose **Databases**), for tracing theses and dissertations include:

- **Dissertations and theses** – covering mainly North American doctoral dissertations and Masters theses. Indexing 1861 - ; Abstracts 1938 -
- **Index to theses** – covers theses accepted for higher degrees by the universities of Great Britain and Ireland. Volume 1 1950/51 to date (abstracts from vol. 35).
- **ETHOS** - Provides access to UK doctoral theses with some links to full text.


Can't Find What You Need?
