A round up of our achievements throughout the past semester.

OSCAR WINNING TALENT

Despite only graduating six years ago, Fonzo Romano has already reached what is probably the highest achievement for an animator – winning an Oscar for his work on the 2016 Disney film *The Jungle Book*.

Fonzo first came to Salford as an Erasmus student whilst studying Cinema back in his home country of Portugal. He was sold on the 3D Animation element of the course, and fell in love with Salford too. He has been winning awards for his work since his University of Salford days, when he won a Royal Television Society student award for his final year project.

Since his first job animating the children's TV show *Babar*, he's built an impressive CV with blockbuster films such as *Guardians of the Galaxy*, *X-Men Apocalypse* and *Life*. Following this incredible success, Fonzo has an even more exciting project coming up – the live action/3D animation remake of *The Lion King*.



UNIVERSITY OF SALFORD PAIR WIN PRESTIGIOUS TV AWARDS

Broadcast Journalism graduate Martina Moscariello won the news category in the Royal Television Society North West Student awards for her *Life In Europe* piece. Martina travelled to the island of Lampedusa, which has become a staging post for migrants trying to cross the Mediterranean from north Africa to Europe, and spoke to people living in refugee camps as well as charity workers and coastguard crews.

Third year Television and Radio student Harry Whitehead won the Short Feature piece for his drama *Wanderlust*. Judges described Harry Whitehead's three-minute piece as a haunting, honest but beautiful portrayal of the impact of suicide. Harry, who produced the short feature for the Camera and Lighting module of his degree, created a visually arresting film, using effects to suggest the emotional turmoil the narrator was experiencing.

The pair will now go to the national RTS Student Awards, to see whether they can follow in the footsteps of BA Journalism graduate Jennifer Henry, who took the News Category last year for her *Life As A Refugee* report aimed at 6-12-year-olds.



STUDENT WINS TWO NATIONAL AWARDS FOR FILM

A TV and Radio first year student Elliot Collier, has won two awards at the Moving Images Awards for his short film. Elliot took home awards for both 'Best Short Film' and '2017 Overall Winner'. The awards are in partnership with the British Film Institute (BFI) and recognise work by talented young film-makers.

Elliot's film, titled *The Last Reel* was shortlisted for 'Short Film' award and was created as part of his time studying at Newcastle-under-Lyme College before joining the University of Salford in September.

The film, which was inspired by Elliot's time studying Film Noir whilst at college, features an unnamed man, who is stopped on his way to work and given a ticket which will admit him to "the ultimate journey of a lifetime."

STUDENT WINS COMEDY AWARD TO JOIN STAND-UP LEGENDS


University of Salford student, Jack Gleadow, has been crowned comedian of the year – in a competition previously won by the likes of Josh Widdicombe, Rhod Gilbert and Romesh Ranganathan, seeing the Hull-born comic following in the footsteps of former Salford student Jason Manford.

Jack is in his final year studying BA Television And Radio at the MediaCityUK campus, but says he uses the University's famous links with comedy to help advance his stand-up career.

Jack, who has previously won accolades including the Amused Moose National New Comic Award and the Great Yorkshire Fringe New Comedian Of The Year title, performed extracts from his show featuring a mix of one-liners, stories, audience participation – and physical gags using his trademark scooter.

He now juggles coursework with performances up and down the country, including at Manchester's Frog And Bucket and Comedy Store venues, he now plans to take his show to the Edinburgh Festival before embarking on a career in stand-up.

The TV and Radio degree at Salford attracts highly creative and talented students each year and allows them to discover their own strengths in storytelling. Comedy legends such as Peter Kay and his Car Share co-star Sian Gibson studied at the University of Salford, while the University launched one of the country's first degree programmes in Comedy Writing and Performance.



CARE LEAVER AWARDED FOR UNIVERSITY WORK

Criminology student, Danny Haughton has received the "High Achievement in Education" Award after leaving care and joining the University of Salford.

Danny who is in his final year of his Criminology course had been in care since the age of nine and despite an unsettled start to life, always knew he wanted to go to university. He won the award at the Tameside Looked After Children Awards, which looks to celebrate the educational, sporting or artistic achievements of children who are in care and care leavers in Tameside.

Despite only 6% of care leavers going on to university, Danny always planned on attending, he says "I always knew I wanted to go to university since I first went into care. I always enjoyed going to school and knew I wanted to go all the way into Higher Education.



STUDENTS WIN 48 HOUR CHALLENGE AT MANCHESTER INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL

NATALIE AITCHISON – from beauty counter manager to thriving nurse

Natalie is in her first year of BSc Adult Nursing at our School of Health and Society. I was lucky enough to spend the afternoon with her, chatting about her experience on the course so far, and getting to know a bit about her life at Salford. I was fascinated to find that Nat had taken a career change from being a beauty counter manager, and decided to enrol herself onto a nursing degree, after feeling like her friendly, chatty personality could be used to care for people in need.

So Nat, what caught your eye about the University of Salford?

I love Manchester as a city anyway and as well as that, my younger brother also studies at Salford. Obviously I'd been to visit him in his halls at Peel Park, and I loved the feel of the place and the atmosphere.

What do you love about nursing?

I enjoy my placements because I'm much more of a practical person in the way I learn, I feel like for me it's a great opportunity to work within a team of professionals, while being guided by your mentor. I like the holistic approach it takes to care, and nursing in the fact that it's integrated care, so it's not just medical assistance. I also work collaboratively with my patients because they will have their own preferences.

What does your typical University day look like?

If I'm in university, I would have lectures throughout the day if it was theoretical work. If I was in on a day when we do practical skill studies, I'd go to uni in my uniform, because it's hands on, so with that, I've already learned how to do injections, first aid, hand hygiene and all of the other precautions that you wouldn't necessarily think about as a patient.

What modules do you cover?

Obviously I'm only five months into my course, but already I've learned so much. At the moment, Nursing and Health is the focus, so looking at social models and how nurses impact the local area in and around Salford, as well as local health trends. But my personal favourite is the practical skills study, where we get to train in a realistic environment.

Do you get a chance to go on placement?

The way the course works, is that we're in uni for five weeks, and then on placement for five weeks. When you begin the course, you spend your first block getting to grips with the University, and then I was on placement for five weeks. Every student is assigned a trust, so for me I am under the "Salford Trust" and that is where all my placements will be, which is perfect for me, because I live on Peel Park, so it's just a 10 minute drive.

What has been your highlight so far?

My highlight has been experiencing how much patients' families value your help. Seeing how your care can spill over into their loved ones lives, it's unlike anything I've experienced. Obviously I can't go into too much detail, but there were a couple of families on my most recent placement, who I could tell were made-up with the help nurses offered them.

Is there anything that you've struggled with in the transition into university life?

I think personally I was panicking about my finances, because I did use to work full-time, so budgeting was difficult, but it's the same for pretty much everyone around you, and it's not like I've ever gone without.

Where do you see yourself in the future?

Nursing is something that could take me all over the world. While you're ultimately studying to go into a profession, the opportunities are much wider than you would think. It doesn't necessarily have to be nursing on a ward in a hospital, you could be a school nurse, specialise in mental health, or go into teaching nursing or counselling.



NATALIE'S TOP TIP:

Be prepared to work hard, it is very rewarding, but is unlike anything else I've ever done. It's not just about the medical side, it's about future planning, which I find fascinating, so now more than ever the course is about illness prevention, and thinking about the influence a nurse has on a community directly and indirectly. Oh and of course have fun while you're doing it.

VIRTUAL STADIUM EXPERIENCE IS THE FUTURE OF SPORT BROADCASTING

The future of sports broadcasting was shown off at an event at MediaCityUK, with a virtual stadium experience immersing viewers.

University of Salford's Centre for Sports Business partnered with DigitalSport.co to feature demonstrations of Augmented Reality (AR) and Virtual Reality (VR). It included an immersive video football match demonstration, designed by Salford student Elena-Mary Calarasu.

Elena filmed a Salford City match on a special camera and then projected the game on a huge screen as a virtual stadium experience. The crowd has also been filmed and was shown on a separate screen behind and sound from the match was projected in 360 degrees.

The result was an incredibly immersive experience that felt more like being at the match than just watching on a TV screen. The idea is that in the future sports clubs could invest in such technology to enable their fans who can't get to games, to still enjoy the match experience and will then become more involved with the club.

INNOVATIVE INITIATIVE INTRODUCES HR STUDENTS TO WORLD OF WORK

Students from the University of Salford are getting a career boost thanks to a project run with the city council.

As well as having the opportunity to visit the council and meet the City Mayor with their lecturer Chris Doran, the initiative enabled the Human Resource students to put their theoretical knowledge into practice. The council identified seven key projects in their HR department and the students were asked to choose one as the topic of their final-year assignment project.

The student with the best assignment was given a full year placement to put their ideas into practice. It was Georgiana Matoianu who finally secured the internship. This was based on her presentation on a strategy to embed the council's values within the organisation, to drive engagement and business success.

The initiative isn't just benefiting the students. It's also supporting delivery of the council's 'Great Eight' key strategic priorities, whilst providing the organisation with fresh thinking around key projects on the council's HR agenda.



GEOGRAPHY COURSES GIVEN 'ROYAL' APPROVAL

The BSc (Hons) Geography and BA (Hons) Geography courses were given the quality seal of approval by the RGS (with the Institute of British Geographers) until 2024. Geography at the University of Salford has also been recently ranked as 27th in the UK, and 3rd in the North West by The Guardian.

The Salford programmes were praised for the range of opportunities for students to work with external practitioners and employers, and for the quality of its practical work, notably field trips to the Peak District, Scandinavia, the Alps and Barcelona.

Geography is a three-year undergraduate course or four years with a placement year and offer flexibility as students have the option to either specialise in human or physical geography or take a more generalised pathway. These opportunities allow students to develop existing and new knowledge/skills which can then be practiced and applied in the field to gain valuable real-world experience relevant for the work place.

STUDENTS' LIFE-CHANGING EXPERIENCES IN THE AMAZON RAINFOREST



Students have described the University's field course to the Amazon rainforest as a 'life-changing experience'. Not only did they spot endangered animals on the brink of extinction and explore a variety of tropical ecosystems, but they also got to swim with river dolphins and play football with an indigenous community.

The two-week January trip sees students on Zoology and Wildlife Conservation degrees flown to a region of Brazil so remote they need a government permit to be allowed there. The group spent their first week in Reserva Ducke, 10,000 hectares of protected area on the outskirts of the Brazilian city of Manaus, a fantastic base to learn about Amazonian species. Their second week involved traveling the Amazon River in which they conducted surveys of the vegetation structure,

invertebrates, birds and fish. Natasha Woest, 33, is one of the lucky 30 students who found the two weeks' experience "extraordinary". In fact she was so impressed, that on her return to Salford, she has been giving talks to raise awareness about the importance of the rainforest. Natasha, who graduates in July, is heading back to the rainforest this summer, this time to Borneo and Mozambique in a project with the Natural History Museum.

NEW DEVICE COULD CHANGE LIVES OF CHILDREN BORN WITHOUT ARMS

A new device being developed at the University of Salford could help thousands of children across the world born without arms.



Researchers are creating a special unit to help youngsters with congenital conditions that mean they have to use myoelectric prosthesis – artificial hands controlled using the electronic signals generated by their own muscles.

These prosthetics are only effective if an electrode is fixed in close contact with the skin, but as artificial limbs for children are deliberately built with some 'growing room' in them, the electrode is often too loose to work properly especially for the first few weeks after a new fitting.

John Head, lecturer in Prosthetics and Orthotics at the University, who is leading the project, believes a crude prototype device he has built could be the answer. The device should enable parents to adjust the electrode's position until a visual cue, such as a green light, shows it has made optimum contact with the skin.

His team will collaborate with the University of Southampton and work with engineers to create a much smaller working model. John said: "It's an incredibly simple idea, but it could make a huge difference to these children's lives."

"We're going to use 3D printing to create something that can be tested on patients, and hopefully this is something that can eventually be manufactured on a much larger scale."

MASTERPLAN WILL TRANSFORM SALFORD'S A6 CORRIDOR *and beyond*

A hugely ambitious masterplan to create a new city district situated between Greater Manchester's Central Business District and Salford's MediaCityUK, transforming the University of Salford campus and surrounding areas, has been agreed between the University and Salford City Council.

The plan sets out a vision for the next two decades enhancing connections with surrounding neighbourhoods and communities and tapping in to the area's unique potential to deliver an unrivalled place to learn, live, work and visit.

The joint approach will link education with local industry, arts, culture, heritage and residential across 240 acres offering one of the largest investment and development opportunities in the region.

Designed by 5plus Architects it identifies three 'zones' of investment: the Adelphi and Crescent neighbourhood; Peel Park and Frederick Road (Main University Campus); and the Frederick Road North Industrial Collaboration Zone.

Across an area extending to 240 acres, it has the potential to deliver:

- / £800 million investment opportunity
- / 2,500 residential new build – apartments and houses and
- / 300,000 sq ft of modern student residential accommodation
- / 25 hectares of transformed, historic parkland
- / 1.6 million sq ft of new commercial innovation floorspace for industrial growth sectors
- / 1.1 million sq ft of new educational floorspace within a 21st century campus with new leisure facilities
- / New hotel and bespoke conferencing suite
- / 2,000 space multi storey car parks across the neighbourhood

- / A new school
- / Local retail & health services
- / New commercial arts workspaces, live-work accommodation for Salford's creatives, public facing, inspiring culture
- / Nearly 2 million sq ft of public realm, green landscaped routes, 5 miles of running tracks, 1.5miles of cycleways and 1,000 trees
- / Ensuring the future of six heritage buildings

Paul Dennett, Salford City Mayor, said: "The City of Salford has attracted billions of pounds of private sector investment in the last decade and delivered nationally important regeneration projects that have brought new industries, new training and development opportunities and new jobs to the city.


"The combined assets of the city and the university around The Crescent present a huge opportunity for the continued growth of the city linking education with enterprise and industry and arts, culture, heritage and community.

Bethany O'Neill is a management trainee at Wilmott Dixon, an independent construction and property services company, and is currently studying for her BSc (Hons) in Quantity Surveying at the University of Salford. Bethany has always had a keen interest in construction and saw the degree apprenticeship as the perfect option to kick start her construction career. We spoke to Bethany to get her take on why she chose the degree apprenticeship route.

How are you finding your degree apprenticeship?

My degree apprenticeship is absolutely amazing. I love it! I really never thought I could love a job as much as I do and I feel really lucky to be working at one of the UK's leading independent construction companies whilst working towards my degree at the University of Salford at the same time.

What are the benefits of doing a degree apprenticeship?

With a degree apprenticeship, you really do get the best of both worlds; you are earning and learning at the same time. You get to put theory into practice from day one and the hands on experience helps with the University work too – you can really appreciate how the concepts you are taught work in the real world. The split between work and study isn't too daunting either, if you are committed and well organised and don't leave things to the last minute, you will be fine.

What would your advice be to others?

KICK START YOUR CAREER

With Higher and Degree Apprenticeships at the University of Salford

Apprenticeships offer a valid alternative to traditional university study. Apprentices will be working towards the same academic qualifications as a traditional degree student but will also be employed in a full-time role. Apprenticeships are available from the University of Salford from Level 4 (the first year of a degree) all the way up to Level 7 (a Master's level qualification).

Degree apprenticeships combine work with study and may include a work-based, academic or combined qualification or a professional qualification relevant to the industry. Apprentices will study part-time at University and will spend the rest of their time in the workplace. If a student is looking for an alternative to traditional University study but still wants to work towards a degree, then a Degree Apprenticeship could be the perfect route for them.

Higher and Degree Apprenticeships are a great path into a long-term career within a chosen subject area. Earning a salary whilst working and best of all, there will be limited student debt as tuition fees will be covered by the employer and/or the Government.

GREENPOWER ELECTRIC CAR CHALLENGE REGIONAL LAUNCH

The Greenpower Electric Car Challenge Regional Launch took place at the University of Salford. It was a fantastic opportunity to see how the Greenpower Challenge can benefit schools in the North West by engaging students in STEM subjects, as well as academics and students from the University.

Before the morning session, Sandbach High School & Sixth Form College and Jaguar Land Rover Greenpower Team showed off their own electric cars that had taken part (as well as won) races across the UK, and chatted to delegates about their involvement in the challenge.

The morning session involved hearing from various speakers about the benefits of Greenpower for learners who are growing up in a world where electric and electric & autonomous vehicles are the future. Industry speakers provided their perspective of Greenpower, including Andrew Cowey, the Head of Digitalisation from Siemens, David Cullimore from Prodrive, and the Jaguar Land Rover Greenpower team.

The Design & Technology teacher, Kevin Gornall from Sandbach High School spoke about their Greenpower journey. "A real highlight was hearing from students at Sandbach High School share their own experiences of the Greenpower Challenge and how not only it benefitted their school but also themselves as individuals, increasing their confidence, and helping them with their UCAS applications."

After the morning session, teachers were invited to attend a workshop to develop an effective deployment model for the region-wide project and network with colleagues to discuss their own challenges and the solutions to overcome these to ensure that the Greenpower Electric Car Challenge would be a success for their students and school.


ENCOUNTERS – THE UNIVERSITY OF SALFORD'S CREATIVE ENGAGEMENT PROGRAMME


