
### CREATE YOUR FUTURE MANCHESTER

#### **BSC (HONS) DIGITAL BUSINESS**



## INFORMATION FOR TEACHERS

#### TIPS FOR A GREAT PERSONAL STATEMENT

Start to prepare your personal statement early on. Without thinking about a structure, it will be harder for you to collect and organise your thoughts later on. Begin with a mind map and formulate this into a plan to help structure your first draft.

Capture the attention of the reader with a sharp introduction; use positive language to show them you're enthusiastic about your chosen subject. Tell the reader about your skills, and how these contribute to your understanding of the subject.

You've chosen a course and now we want to know why this is the right course for you. What interests you about it? And why do you want to study this subject with us? Showcase your passion and enthusiasm for the degree you're applying for.

Your work experience and interests are also important, as this can highlight why you're the perfect student for the course. Are you part of a club? Do you have an unusual hobby? Entry requirements are transparent, you and your experiences are unique.

Conclude your personal statement by summarising your key strengths, and reiterate that you are ready (both socially and academically) for university life. Be confident, keep it positive, and really sell yourself.

Remember that you don't have an unlimited number of words, so be clear and concise - don't waffle. Don't expect your first draft to be perfect; ask a teacher or careers advisor to check it over for you so that your spelling and grammar are spot on.

Find courses in the UCAS search tool. Check entry requirements and application deadlines:

- / 15 October all courses at Oxford, Cambridge and most courses in medicine, veterinary science / medicine and dentistry
- / 15 January the majority of courses

1. Apply online

A HANDY GUIDE TO SHARE WITH YOUR STUDENTS

The universities or colleges will decide whether to make you an offer. It'll be:

- / either unconditional if you've already met the entry requirements
- / or conditional if the offer's based on your exam results.

You'll see in Track if your place is

If your firm choice is unconditional -

2. Wait to hear back

If you're not accepted by all five universities or colleges, or you decline the offers you receive, you can use extra to apply for more choices, one at a time.

3. Reply to your offers

Once all the decisions are in, you have to reply to your offers by a specific deadline.

- / Select a firm choice this is your first choice
- / If your firm choice is conditional. select an insurance choice too. If you want - this is a back-up choice in case you don't meet the conditions for your firm choice
- / Decline any other offers.

4. Find out if you've got your place

If you do better than expected, and meet and exceed the conditions of your firm choice, you can look for an alternative course using Adjustment, if you want to.

## SALFORD PARTNERS WITH PANASONIC

A great example of our industry collaboration strategy in action, the University is currently working with Panasonic to educate the next generation of film makers. Students are using a range of Panasonic VariCam, Eva1 and Lumix GH5 cameras to enable them to produce their short films on our BA (Hons) Film Production course, which aims to develop multi-disciplined film makers.

Salford chose Panasonic to provide students with production cameras because they were already being readily used for highend feature, drama, natural history and documentary production, as well as popular Netflix Original series' such as Ozark, After Life and Orange is the New Black.

### STUDENTS NOMINATED FOR

BBC AWARDS

Two University of Salford students have been nominated in the BBC's prestigious Today Programme Student Journalism Awards 2019

Third year BA (Hons) Broadcast Journalism student Ellie Kemp has earned a place in the Student Journalist of the Year category Nominees for the coveted award were hand-picked by a panel of BBC executives including Editor of the Today programme Sarah Sands, Editorial Director Kamal Ahmed, Development Director Katie Lloyd and Head of Talent Daniell Morrisey.

On entering the award, Nottingham-born Ellie said:

"We were required to submit a selection of our best work – I am really interested in music and health so entered some pieces that showcased my passions."

"Studying at MediaCity UK means you're surrounded by broadcasting giants like BBC and ITV. You can't help but feel inspired by that. During my degree I've had so many great opportunities for work experience – two weeks at BBC Radio 5 Live being a real highlight."

Also up for an award is graduate George Haigh who studied Journalism at master's level at Salford. Radio enthusiast George submitted three sound packages in his application, including a piece he compiled on Greater Manchester's Green Summit 2019 back in May.





George, who since graduating has landed a role at Global Radio, said: "It's a great feeling to be nominated and I'm looking forward to heading down to London for the awards.

"I'm really interested in music, culture, sport and the environment so I tend to focus my packages around subjects I'm drawn to. It's great that my work is being recognised for such a prestigious award."

Paul Broster, Director of Journalism at the University of Salford said: "We are absolutely delighted for Ellie and George that the Today programme has recognised their talent. Their nominations again show the strength and quality we have built over many years now in our accredited undergraduate and postgraduate journalism programmes at MediaCityUK."

Sarah Sands, Editor of the Today Programme and chair of the judges, said: "The future of the Today programme depends on the intelligence, curiosity and integrity that we are discovering in our universities. We are so cheered by the standard of entries for the Today programme student media awards. This is progress in action and I am impatient to see this new generation of journalism on our show."

It's not the first time a student from the University's School of Arts and Media has been nominated for these awards. Last year Broadcast Journalism graduate Nikola Bartosova scooped the Student Broadcaster of the Year 2018 prize after submitting a moving report on how people live with chronic health disorders. The winners of the award will be announced at a ceremony in the BBC's Radio Theatre in London next week on 28 October 2019.






## UNIVERSITY SOCIETY QUAYS TV TO HOST

# LEARNING DISABILITIES NURSING AND SOCIAL WORK

(INTEGRATED PRACTICE)

Why is the course name such a mouthful we hear you ask?

Well, it has every right to be. The Learning Disabilities Nursing and Social Work (Integrated Practice) programme will see you graduate with TWO qualifications instead of one. Students completing this course will qualify to practise as both a learning disabilities nurse and a social worker – how many degrees can boast that?

We spoke to recent graduate, Paige, who was nominated to represent the University of Salford at the Houses of Parliament for Learning Disability Week 2019. Read on to find out her experience at Salford and what she's up to now!



What course did you study, and why did you choose salford?

I studied Integrated Practice. I chose Salford because it is one of the three universities in the UK that deliver this joint course – and you graduate with one degree but two qualifications.

How did your time at university set you up for a career, and what are you doing now?

I went on six practice placements which equipped me with lots of experience, as well as opening my eyes to what kind of job opportunities would be available once I had qualified. My final placement was with the Salford Royal Foundation Trust. I worked alongside the Joint Adults Learning Disabilities Team, who work with people from the age of 18 with learning disabilities. Throughout my time with the team, I learnt a lot of skills I use in my everyday practice now.

You had to complete 100 days in practice, and at the end of my placement the manager actually offered me a temporary contact. I then went on to apply for a permanent job where I was successful and secured a position.

I have gone on to develop nursing and social work skills in my everyday practice working alongside social workers, occupational therapists, physiotherapists, speech and language therapists, art therapists, psychologists and psychiatrists.

I still work on this team as a community nurse and I really love what I do!

We understand you went to parliament to represent the university of salford for learning disability week 2019, how did you get the opportunity?

I was nominated by my team manager to go to parliament, this was for a celebration for the centenary. The event was open to learning disabilities nurses based all over the UK. Nurses did have to be nominated to go; I think there were about 150 people there. This was for the celebration of the centenary of Learning Disabilities Nursing as a profession.

#### What did it involve?

On arrival we had canapés, there were talks by two different organisations, Dance Syndrome who are based in Greater Manchester and Books and Beyond. Both are charities run by families of people with learning disabilities.

There were also nurses sharing short stories about what inspired them to become a learning disabilities nurse or people that had made a big difference to their practice.

Did you take part in any of the activities around campus for learning disability week? If so, which ones?

I took part in the event on Thursday, Bridge College came and did a sing and sign session. This is also when the awards were presented by the Deputy Chief Nurse.



#### What's one thing you have learned from learning disability week?

I learned how much a learning disabilities nurse means to the people we support, some of the client group also spoke at the event in London and they were able to share how much of an impact we have on their lives.


#### BA (HONS) DANCE – HEAR FROM LAURENCE, KELLY AND CHLOE-ANN.


#### **New Opportunity**

#### **OUTREACH OPPORTUNITIES**



The annual Greater Manchester Care Leaver Awards took place in October at the Royal Northern College of Music. The glittering awards ceremony celebrates the achievements of young people who have experience of the care system and have succeeded across a range of categories, including education, work, culture, sport and activism. This year saw 326 nominations - a record number!

Guests and nominees enjoyed an evening featuring entertainment from a swing dance society, witness poems, written and delivered, by care-experienced ambassadors from the Greater Manchester Youth Network (GMYN) project, and a rap written and performed by a member of Gorse Hill Creative Studios. These were truly inspirational moments, and it was an honour that these young people shared their personal stories.

University of Salford are proud to be a part of the Greater Manchester Higher Network who organise the event alongside the Looked After Children's forum in partnership with all local authorities in Greater Manchester. GM Higher's mission is to reduce the gap in participation in higher education between the most and the least advantaged. Care leavers are significantly less likely to progress to HE than their non-care experienced counterparts. In 2013/14 just 6% of care leavers were in higher education compared with around one-third of all 19-year-olds.

A final-year student, who is care-experienced was nominated for an award by her local authority attended the ceremony and said,

It was such a lovely evening, it was so nice to see so many people that have experienced struggles being recognised and it felt good knowing they felt encouraged and so positive!
